Rolls-Royce, Past, Present and Future: Sustaining the Traditions of Sir Henry Royce

This talk will focus initially on Sir Henry Royce himself and the early years of the company. His brilliance as an engineer and his attention to detail earned the company the reputation of building the best motor cars in the world.

Its entry into the gas turbine business and the challenges occasioned by the development of the RB211 engine, which led to its insolvency in 1971, will be described. Its subsequent successful development, including the current Trent family of engines, and its entry into engines for naval propulsion and electricity generation will round off the presentation.

Following a few years in the aircraft industry, Frank Matthews spent most of his career as a member of academic staff in the Aeronautics department at Imperial College London where one of his activities was to give undergraduate lectures on historical aspects of aircraft development. He also ran both teaching and research programmes with industrial and academic links in Europe and the USA.

His interest in the current talk was sparked two years ago when reading a journal report on a seminar devoted to these women. Since then there has been more publicity, including a BBC documentary, about this largely unknown aspect of World War II.

The Science Group

You will know that plants and animals are made up of large numbers of cells, but do you know the origin of the term? You would if you had attended the Science Group's talk by Adam Prickett on

Advances in DNA Sequencing. Do you know why there is still no conclusive theory to explain the properties of Ball Lightning? You would if you had attended our talk by Mark Steinhoff. These are but two examples of the Science Group's **talks**, open to all members, on the second Monday of each month in the Otford Memorial Village Hall.

The Committee which puts together the programme encompasses a broad knowledge of science, technology and engineering, and provide a balance of talks across all three disciplines. Attendance is open to all members of Sevenoaks U3A. The objective of the talks is to help them keep abreast of current scientific thinking. After all, it is a "few" years since any of us received any formal teaching on this subject and so much "progress" has been made since then that such scientific things dominate our lives: think about the food we eat and you may recall headlines about BSE, genetically-engineered foods and horse meat; consider the sources of energy we use and you cannot fail to be reminded of wind farms, nuclear power, shale gas; think about the weather and the on-going debate about global warming will spring to your mind. The only certainty is that this is a trend set to continue.

The Group also organises two or three **outings** each year to places of scientific and/or engineering interest, also open to the whole membership. The focus here is on scientific and engineering topics which are best covered visually or hands-on. In the past, these have included visits to the Enigma Museum at Bletchley Park and the Shepherd Neame Brewery in Faversham. This year's visits will include a tour of the Cook factory at Sittingbourne, a visit to Greenwich Royal Observatory and individual visits to see the once again restored Cutty Sark, and the 50th Anniversary static and flying displays of the Shuttleworth Collection at the Old Walden aerodrome near Milton Keynes.

The other key part of the Science Group's work is its **study groups**, five at present. Details are in the adjoining column. In all cases, subjects of discussion are chosen by the membership.

Suggestions for new Groups and subjects and/or speakers for talks are appreciated. Volunteers for the committee as and when vacancies arise are welcome. The talks programme for the 2013/2014 session is now complete: if you want to know all about the ageing brain, how 3D-printing works or the origins of Norvasc and Viagra, do come along.

The **ethical dilemmas study group** is an open minded group who like to discuss topical moral and ethical issues of the day. Often we will have opposing views on the topics we discuss which makes the meetings more interesting. By its nature Ethics is a subject where right and wrong answers are problematic, so different views are welcomed. We often come away with our previous opinions modified. We usually have someone to research the topic and lead the debate. We have recently widened our discussions from mainly medical issues to anything that is morally controversial. Some of the topics that we have covered recently include Obesity, who's to blame? Parents' rights, Media responsibility and Problems with drugs. Our members obviously enjoy arguing as we have high meeting attendance with few leavers!

The **geology study group** investigates all aspects of geology from the formation of the Earth to the many changes from the Pre-Cambrian, 4 billion years ago, to the present time. The group also follows a 36-part DVD lecture on subjects related to geology: tectonic plate movements, volcanology, mountain building, rock-formation, mineralogy and many more. At the moment we are concentrating on sedimentation and the sedimentary rocks formed as a result of this process. When the weather permits, fossil-hunting and rock studying trips are arranged. Members photograph rock formations and collect samples. They write short articles about the sites visited and present these to the group.



The **our universe study group** investigates the science of the universe. Included are topics such as how we know the life history of the stars, how far away they are, how old space is and the awesome range of astronomical objects and forces out there.

The two **science discussion study groups** cover any science-related topic. This year, **Group 1** is focussing on two main topics: global population growth and weather science. For global population, we are looking at the predicted growth of the human population - from seven to eight billion over the next decade or so - and then at the impact this will have on food supplies, energy requirements and trade, all areas of potential stress that could lead to conflict. For weather science, we are focussing on both historical methods and the modern predictive approach to weather forecasting. **Group 2** is a new one. Its key topic this year is energy, both from the point of view of its generation from various sources and its consumption.

## Latest news on forthcoming visits:

- A flyer is enclosed for a Thames river trip on Wednesday 3 July.
- A visit has been arranged for 14 August to the Turner Gallery at Margate plus the Salutation Gardens in Sandwich: flyer available in May.

### **Discussion with Knole Extramural team:**

For the past three years, Sevenoaks and Knole U3A have been running social events in parallel, and have been pleased to offer spare places to the other and so ensure that all the trips run. The two committees decided to meet in March to see if closer co-operation could benefit both U3As.

It was established at once that Knole did not foresee a total merger of the two teams, mainly because of the volume of work, the difficulty of allocating places on a shared trip, and the loss for Knole - of a chance for its own members, who come from a very wide area, to get to know each other.

However, both teams thought there was potential benefit from closer liaison which might take these forms:

- an annual planning meeting at the end of the season, say October or early November, to review the successes and snags of the previous year and pass on experiences
- to exchange details of the trips that were well received
- to liaise more closely over similar trips, so that those who couldn't go on one date might be accommodated on the trip of the other U3A
- to review the service provided by coach companies and their charges
- possibly to each arrange a parallel trip, with one Study Day as an introduction (this is a formula which so far has proved very successful with Knole, with seminars on William Morris and the Red House, Dover Castle, Japanese Gardening and Pompeii and Herculaneum). An added benefit of this system is the possible formation of a new Study Group based on the subject
- to continue to offer over spare places, which was considered a success story
- a list of the visits undertaken by both U3As would be circulated, together with a list from the Kent Network

#### **Trip to Arundel Castle**

Knole has spare places on a coach trip to **Arundel Castle**, which was built by Roger De Montgomery in the 11th century. For much of that time it has been the home of the Dukes of Norfolk and their ancestors.

#### New U3As

An outline steering committee was formed and will have a first meeting with the representative from National Office on 16 May to adopt a constitution and arrange to open a bank account. The follow-up meeting, when the new U3A will take subscriptions and recruit to Study Groups, is scheduled for Thursday 11 July, in Westerham Village Hall, at 2pm.

On the same day, the launch took place of a new U3A in Rainham with about 200 attending, so it has also got off to a flying start! We are delighted to welcome two new U3As into being.
