At present, we are a small group so any budding pianists of above beginner standard would be welcome. For any interest and further details please contact me; Tony Buick.




## **Snooker Group**

#### **U3A TRIP TO WINCHELSEA AND RYE**


On 14 April, after weeks of dull days and rain, we were, after a misty start, blessed with a beautiful sunny day for our visit to East Sussex. Our goal was the Bastide Town of Winchelsea.

The original Winchelsea was washed away by successive storms in the mid-late 13th century and, as it was an important port, was rebuilt on a nearby hill by Edward I. The design was based on that of the fortified bastide towns of the King's native area in southwest France.

The original grid pattern of the surviving streets and 3 entry gates (if not much of the walls) still exist. Winchelsea is no longer a port and the original town has shrunk in area and its population which in the middle ages was some 3,000 is now around 600.

Beneath the town there are some 50 medieval cellars which were used originally to store wine and other goods. About half of us left the coach in this 'ancient' town to take a guided tour of a few of them. We had a fascinating experience, especially as Robert, our guide, added in a visit to the beautiful church of St Thomas and the rarely-accessible romantic ruins of the monastery of Greyfriars.

Leaving some of the party viewing the medieval cellars in Winchelsea the rest carried on to Rye for the morning. As we



arrived the mist lifted so we were able to enjoy a very good view from the lookout point at the end of the High Street near the Landgate. As it was the weekend the Rye Town Museum was open which, though small, is interesting and also showed a good film on the history and people who lived in the town. The more adventurous climbed the church tower to enjoy an even better view of the surrounding countryside. In the newly refurbished Rye Art Gallery the Society of Rye Artists had their work on display as well other artists and ceramicists from around the country. Rye even has its own chocolate shop, chocolate made locally, but with high quality cocoa sourced from Central and South America.

The afternoon was spent by the whole party in Winchelsea visiting six of the town's 'secret gardens'; secret because they are not visible from the street. These were all in full spring splendour and each of us had his or her own special favourite.

The teas were excellent too!
