The Kent Network - new developments:

There are 17 U3As in Kent, from Dartford down to Thanet and they have a combined membership of about 7,000. Three times a year, the Chairmen meet to discuss issues of mutual interest and concern, and the same informal system - roughly speaking - has been in place for 15 years.

At the meeting in July 2011, however, a change to a more formal structure was made, with the adoption of an 'Agreement', and the election of a small Committee of three Officers. This is not earth-shattering stuff, but it indicates the slow metamorphosis felt by U3As up and down the country. Nobody anticipated nearly 30 years ago that the U3A would turn into the popular and indeed landmark organisation it is today. The rather casual structure which we all relish, because it allows local variations to thrive, starts to break down when the numbers become very large and unwieldy, and at that point more in the way of local organisation is called for.

Nowadays, questions that beset National Office, and the Network U3As, are:

- Who is to start up new U3As and be responsible for seeing that this is done correctly? (Legal, banking and Charity Commission requirements are rather more stringent than they used to be.)
- How are 'overlapping' U3As to be managed?
- How can National Office keep in contact with 35 Networks and nearly 800 U3As without more help on the ground?

To assist with the dramatic growth of U3A membership, more funds are being channelled directly to the Networks, for 'training' purposes for example, or local Conferences, and all of this means that some structure is essential. Hence the formation of a Kent Committee with a Constitution, albeit a loose one.

How U3As in a Network co-operate:

Kent is lucky. It has fostered good working relationships between U3As for a long time and the benefits of co-operation are clear. The most obvious is exchanging details on suitable speakers for the Monthly Meetings, but we also want to extend this to suggestions for Visits and Study Days. Some events can absorb a large audience, and in West Kent we have successfully advertised spare places to the adjacent U3As.

Best practice can also be shared, for example advice on applying for Gift Aid (one U3A Chairman said in July that she had never heard of it!) or how to manage the database with an ever-increasing membership. Hearing about other approaches is always interesting. Canterbury continues to run most of its Study Groups on the basis of joining for a single year, like an Adult Ed or WEA course:

members apply by post, with a cheque enclosed to pay for each subject, and an impressive allocation system begins whereby everybody gets ONE first choice! However, those of us who adhere to the 'continuing membership' school of thought still feel that *belonging* to a U3A Study Group is part of its special nature.

Of course, the **Kent Study Days** are the best instance of co-operation across the board. These have proved to be very successful, are open to everyone in Kent, and are an attempt to offer properly academic events to U3A members on a range of topics. The funds they have generated may be used to support the general Network meetings, as happens elsewhere.

Other Events:

Kent, with Surrey and Sussex, is part of a larger regional network called the **South East Forum** and it organises several events throughout the year, Seminars (there is one in Tonbridge on Wednesday 26th October), a Conference in East Grinstead each spring, and the annual Summer School in Chichester. Watch out for details of these in U3A News and our own Newsletters.

New U3As in the pipeline:

In July, it was agreed to start a new U3A in **Paddock Wood**. The adjacent U3As, Malling and Tonbridge, welcomed this since they are under pressure of numbers, as Sevenoaks was when it prompted both of those U3As into life. The Kent Volunteer (responsible for working with new U3As at the set-up stage) is **Pauline Hawker**, the founder Chairman of Pembury U3A. **The launch meeting is Thursday 3 November 2011 at 2pm in St Andrew's Church Hall, Paddock Wood.** If you have friends who would like to join or assist this new U3A, they should contact Pauline on © 1892 824327.

Other centres are Gillingham & Rainham (as a splinter from Medway), Sheppey & Swale, and possibly Ashford, currently being 'minded' by Wye because a first run at starting a separate U3A there didn't take off. Again, if you have friends who might generate interest in these locations, they should get in touch with Pauline Hawker.

Does this matter?

We have all learned that the U3A community creates a culture which is social as well as intellectual, and this precept doesn't stop at the town walls! Those who have read the **Objects** and **Principles** of the U3A will have been inspired by the broad and selfless aims of the organisation. So a healthy context for new and existing U3As is of benefit to all the members.
